




I'm not sure if gospel is the write description but hymns like It is Well with My Soul. I also like the very majestic hymns like Guide Me O Thou Great Jehovah.












Please tell about your experience of Calvary's work in mission

Pretty difficult if there is no support or interest from parishioners beyond the very basics. We are an aging parish, people with issues that often prevent involvement in activities that might have been of interest in years past. That said, there are still people who are willing to try- often the same people taking on the many tasks, over and over. We are called to walk in The Way, to follow the teachings of Christ. Maybe our "mission" is to look out for each other, to be visitors to and prayer partners for each other. Even as we age we have gifts which we are called to share- maybe encourage this in some way. The Food Pantry (and Lord's Acre) are excellent examples of how our parish, and our neighbor parishes have reached the poor and underserved. And these are huge undertakings which have certainly "qualified" as MISSION in serving others. Maybe this is our calling and we need to use our energy and abilities to continue this mission.

Keep the main thing in mind. Mission (like worship, spiritual formation, etc) is not just a box to check off. Recognize ways congregants participate in mission that are not part of the official "program".



Continue to build on the mission of the food pantry. If parish members have a vision for another mission or outreach, that should be explored and possibly supported. It was a vision of need which led to the food pantry.

Calvary's outreach is heartfelt and directly helps the community. The Food Pantry and the Lord's Acre has greatly enhanced Calvary's mission. Father J is dedicated to the church and its mission; he consistently focuses on God's word and does a tremendous job with limited finances and ongoing challenges due to decreased membership. Covid challenges continue to impact churches in unexpected ways. Deacon Jackie does a great job providing uplifting spiritual support. The Vestry, Staff, and Calvary parishioners are amazing in their continued efforts to expand Calvary's offerings and provide loving spiritual guidance. Can't think of any areas that need improving.
